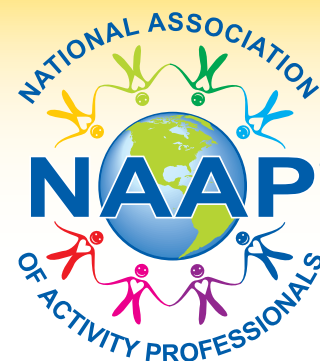

Unfortunately, many workshops focus on “motivation” but few seek to teach others how to “inspire.” It’s about connecting hearts to the mission and uncovering the desires and dreams of others for their success. These seven principles will set you on the road to know when to motivate and how to inspire. Leave the session knowing that others can benefit from your commitment to their hopes.

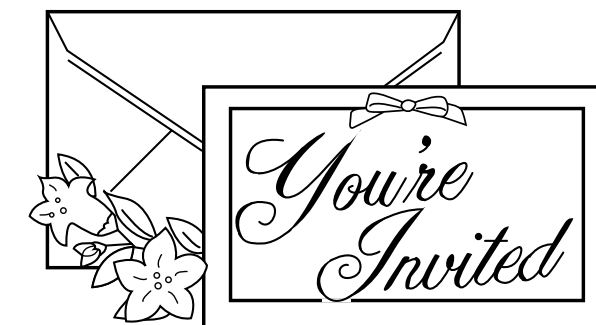
